NEW SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME AND STATE SUPPLEMENTARY PAYMENT RATES AND NON-MEDICAL OUT-OF-HOME CARE PAYMENT STANDARDS FOR 2013

New Supplemental Security Income (SSI)/State Supplementary Payment (SSP) rates are effective January 1, 2013. The new rates reflect a slight increase to the SSI portion of the benefit. UPDATED RESIDENTIAL CARE FACILITY FOR THE ELDERLY REGULATIONS

Senate Bill 781 (Leno), Chapter 617, Statutes of 2009 added Section 1569.683 to the Health and Safety Code. This law requires licensees of a Residential Care Facility for the Elderly (RCFE) to include specified information in the notice to quit (eviction notice) given to residents prior to their eviction. The purpose of this law is to provide consumer awareness and to ensure that eviction notices do not violate residents' rights.

HEALTH AND SAFETY REMINDERS

AVOID WILD MUSHROOMS

Collecting, serving, and eating wild mushrooms can cause serious illness and even death. In November 2012, four people died and two were sickened at an elder care home in Northern California after a caretaker served them gravy made from mushrooms that sprouted in the backyard.

Every year across the United States, more than 9,000 cases of mushroom ingestions are reported to the American Association of Poison Control Centers. Many hundreds of these cases of mushroom ingestions occur each year in California, according to the California Poison Control Centers (CPCS).

Eating wild mushrooms have caused multiple illnesses, hospitalizations and deaths. Eating poisonous mushrooms also can cause abdominal pain, cramping, vomiting, diarrhea, liver damage and death. Individuals who develop any of these symptoms after eating wild mushrooms should seek medical attention.

OBTAIN INFLUENZA VACCINATION

During the flu season, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommend a yearly full vaccine in protecting against this serious disease. Flu activity commonly peaks in January or February. Seasonal flu activity, however, can begin as late as May. The CDC has information about the 2012-13 influenza season, vaccination recommendations and disease activity. HELP PREVENT THE SPREAD OF NOROVIRUSES

Each year, more than 20 million cases of gastroenteritis caused by noroviruses, which range from simple nausea to food poisoning, occur across the United States, according to the CDC. This virus, which is not related to the flu, is estimated to cause over 70,000 hospitalizations and 800 deaths each year in the U.S.

Noroviruses are spread very easily, especially by sick food handlers and by eating contaminated commercial foods such as leafy vegetables, fruits, and oysters. There is

no vaccine for norovirus; however, the following tips can help prevent contracting or transmitting the illness:

- wash hands thoroughly with soap and water;
- take care in the kitchen – wash all fruits and vegetables thoroughly – and cook oysters and other seafood thoroughly as well;
- clean and disinfect contaminated surfaces; and
- wash laundry thoroughly.

According to the CDC, each year, one in every three adults ages 65 or older falls and two million are treated in emergency departments for fall-related injuries.
